Correspondence and papers of Andrew Drummond (b. 1811), Canadian banker, and his sons, Charles, George, and Frank, business men. 1839-1923.

Presented to the Library by Miss Peggy Drummond, a descendant, in November 1984.

Material includes a variety of family letters as well as letters from Sir Sandford Fleming, Sir Oliver Mowat, and Sir John Schultz. Noteworthy items include early correspondence (1841-1848) relating to St. Andrew's Church in Ottawa; Andrew Drummond's reminiscences, dated 1896, describing his experience as an accountant and cashier in the Bank of Montreal in the 1837 Rebellion, the Fenian Raids, and during later disturbances; correspondence and scrapbooks on the attempt to promote the Hudson's Bay Railway, 1883-1890; papers re George Drummond's invention of a new typewriter, 1888-1889. Significant items are listed in more detail below.

#### BIOGRAPHICAL BACKGROUND

Andrew Drummond, born in Edinburgh in 1811, and a graduate of Edinburgh University, emigrated to Canada in 1833 to join his uncle, Robert Drummond, who was engaged in developing the Rideau Canal. After his uncle's death in 1834 Andrew joined the Commercial Bank of Canada in Kingston and in 1843 became Manager of the Bank in Ottawa. Subsequently he went into the Bank of Montreal, becoming Manager in Ottawa in 1846. He continued with this Bank until his retirement in 1885, and was still alive in 1898. In 1838 he married Margaret Sinclair, the niece and adopted daughter of Sir Oliver Mowat's father. Andrew and Margaret had nine children. Of these, Charles, in Winnipeg, was deeply involved in promoting the Hudson's Bay Railway (1888-1889); Frank, also of Winnipeg, was associated with the Northwest Navigation Company; George, of Ottawa, attempted to set up a Company to promote a new version of the typewriter invented by him (1888#-89).
