BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Sir Charles George Douglas Roberts (1860-1943), a poet and animal story writer, was born at Douglas, York County, New Brunswick, and educated at the University of New Brunswick (B.A., 1879, M.S., 1881, and L.L.D., 1906). From 1879 to 1883 he taught school in Chatham and Fredericton, New Brunswick, from 1883 to 1884 he edited The Week, from 1885 to 1895 he taught at King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, and from 1897 to 1907 he lived and wrote in New York. 1907 he went to Europe, settling in England in 1911. During the First World War he served with the British Army and then with the Canadian Army. In 1925 he returned to Toronto where he lived until he died in 1943. During his stay in Toronto, he continued to write, and he lectured. These letters reflect some of his activities, and his friendship with William Arthur Deacon to whom he presented the typescript, <u>Iceberg</u>, in 1931, three years before it was published (1934).

Theodore Goodridge Roberts (1877-1953), a poet, novelist, military historian and youngest brother of Sir Charles, was born at Fredericton, New Brunswick. Educated at the University of New Brunswick, he was a war correspondent during the Spanish-American war for the Independent(New York). During the First World War he served in the Canadian Army. Although he published thirty novels and several volumes of military history his poetry was better known, especially The Leather Bottle (1934). During 1930 he edited and published Acadie, a journal which had seven issues.
