Biographical Note

Gilbert Edward Jackson was born on March 2, 1890 at Hedon, East Yorks, England, to Dr. John L. Jackson and Ida Beatrice (nee Bird), daughter of Henry James Bird of Market Rasen in Lincs. He received his education in England, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1911 from St. John's College, University of Cambridge. In 1911, Mr. Jackson immigrated to Canada and in that same year, joined the University of Toronto as Lecturer in Economics. In 1916 he took leave from his academic duties to serve in the 2nd Battalion, Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment, and British Army. He was later promoted to 2nd Lieutenant in the 6th Battalion, Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. After his discharge in 1919, Mr. Jackson resumed his position at the University of Toronto where he eventually became a professor of economics, a position he held until 1935. Mr. Jackson became the Editor of the *Canadian Forum* (1920-1925) and was appointed the first Director of the course in Commerce and Finance at the University (1926-1935). While on the faculty of the Department of Political Economy he also served as Secretary and Member of the Ontario Commission on Unemployment (1915-1916), President of the University College Literary Society (1920-1921), Chairman of Ontario Employment Service Council (1921-1923), Speaker at the Hart House Debates (1924-1926), and was the first Economist for The Bank of Nova Scotia (1926-1935).

In 1921, Mr. Jackson married Marjorie Lillian Kirkpatrick of Toronto and they had two children, John Denison and Joan Mary. Marjorie Jackson died tragically in the spring of 1927 when the children were still young. Mr. Jackson married Maria Elizabeth (Liesel) Ewringmann, the children's governess in 1932 and during the Second World War they adopted a young girl named Mary whose parents were lost at sea. In 1944, his son died in action while serving in Normandy during the Second World War. His second wife died shortly after. By 1956, Mr. Jackson married Sadie McCool.

In 1935, Mr. Jackson resigned from the University to become Advisor to the Governors of the Bank of England, a position he held until 1939. On his return to Canada in 1939 he became a general business consultant for numerous corporations. During the Second World War he was acting Director of the School of Commerce at McGill University (1940), a member of the Industrial Disputes Enquiry Commission, National War Labour Board (1941-1943), and member of the National Selective Service Advisory Board (1942-1945). His services during the war were honoured by Britain when he was made Officer of the Order of the British Empire in 1946 and appointed to the Order of King Christian X of Denmark for war work.

In 1944, his firm of consultants became Gilbert Jackson & Associates, a 'think-tank' focusing on business and economic issues. Among the consultants in his firm were retired Colonel William Wallace Goforth and John L. (Lorne) McDougall. He also founded an investment management company Canadian York Finance Company Limited in 1939. In 1947 the name was changed to Sentinel Associates of Canada Limited which continues in operation to this day.

During this period, Mr. Jackson was a member of numerous clubs, which included: Savage (London); Carlton (England); the Cambridge Union Society (England); York (Toronto); Arts and Letters (Toronto); the University Club (Montreal); and the Rideau Club (Ottawa).

Mr. Jackson was the author of *An economist's confession of faith* (Toronto: Macmillan, 1935), *If thine enemy hunger!* (Canadian Institute of International Affairs, 1941) and *Facts in the Case* (Ambassador Books Ltd., 1944). In addition he served as editor of the *Canadian Forum* 1920-1925), published papers on economics, and delivered speeches in Britain, the USA and Canada. He died June 16, 1959.

Scope and Content

The fonds consists of the personal papers of Gilbert Edward Jackson, a former professor of economics at the University of Toronto. Compiled from inventories of three accessions, the fonds documents Mr. Jackson's career, participation and achievements as an economist, consultant and professor in Canada and England, during the early 1920s to late 1950s, with the greatest emphasis being on the mid 1930s to early 1950s. Arranged chronologically by function, the fond is divided into ten series. They include: Personal material, related to various activities, accomplishments and events that occurred in Mr. Jackson's private life; Teaching activities; Manuscripts written by Mr. Jackson; the Canadian Tariff Board; the National War Labour Board; the National Selective Service Advisory Board; Other Federal Government research and reports; the Bank of England; his consulting firm, Gilbert Jackson & Associates; and Photographs.

Within the fonds, a cross over among these series exists as the research Mr. Jackson completed for himself was also utilized for assignments produced for other consulting economists and firms. For instance, the research that was completed to write submissions to the Canadian Tariff Board (Series 4) was also utilized to publish articles located in Series 3 (Manuscripts) and Series 9 (Gilbert Jackson & Associates). Related topics can also be found in Series 5 (National War Labour Board) through Series 7 (Other Federal Government research and reports, as they document the extensiveness of Mr. Jackson's involvement and research completed for the Federal Government of Canada between the late 1920s to 1950s. Although the material within the series are for different Boards, this cross over among the series documents Mr. Jackson's involvement and active role within the world of Canadian economics during the mid twentieth century.

Although Mr. Jackson taught at the University of Toronto for roughly 15 years, only a small amount of records exist in the fonds that document his teaching career. The records that do exist in Series 2, (Teaching activities) provide a brief overview of the themes covered and issues addressed during his lectures delivered in the 1950's. However, additional documents related to Mr. Jackson's academic career at the University of Toronto can be found in Series 3 (Manuscripts), the correspondence in Series 8 (Bank of England), and Series 9 (Gilbert Jackson & Associates) as the records within the files highlight his relationships, activities, teaching and mentoring of graduate students who attended the University of Toronto.

This fonds will be of great interest to researchers studying the financial condition of Canada and England during the Great Depression and First and Second World Wars. An individual who sharpened the minds of the youth at the time, Gilbert Jackson's fonds documents the ideologies that shaped the economic world of today, as "it has been said that half the leading economists in Canada today studied under him"¹

Series 1 Personal

The series consists of records documenting Gilbert Edward Jackson's family life and professional career, from the early 1920s to his death in 1959. Arranged alphabetically by function, the files of the series include: typed autobiographical notes illustrating Mr. Jackson's life from the day he was born until 1919, prior to his emigration to Toronto; two biographical sketches highlighting key moments within Mr. Jackson's personal and professional career; typed and handwritten incoming and outgoing correspondence from family members, friends, colleagues and acquaintances regarding the death of his son, John Denison Jackson (1944), Mrs. Maria Elizabeth Jackson's estate (1952-1953), notes of thanks for reference letters, gifts and lunch meetings, personal regards for his family, and an unsigned letter to Misses Jackson, Mr. Jackson's sisters regarding the economist's declining health (1959); a handwritten copy of Mr. Jackson's obituary (1959); and a photograph of a portrait of Mr. Jackson (B2004-0019/001P). Within the files of correspondence, the letters are arranged chronologically, except for those offering condolences to Mr. Jackson for the loss of his son which are arranged alphabetically by the last-name of the sender.

The series also consists of several files of press clippings about Mr. Jackson's personal life, career moves, thoughts, views, as well as Canada's economic stance on various issues. The subject matter of the newspaper clippings include: France and Germany's economic situation after World War I; Canada's immigration policies (1923), tariff fallacies and taxation system (ca. 1935); unemployment insurance within Canada; the analogous trading problems with England (1934); Mr. Jackson's speech on overcoming the depression and difficulties through the improvement of the human character before the Empire Club in the Royal York Hotel (1933) and Canadian Club in Ottawa (1934); being appointed Economic Adviser to the Governors of the Bank of England (1935); the selling of Mr. Jackson's house in Toronto prior to leaving for England (1935); the return of economic liberalism to Canada; the doctrine of free trade; and reviews about Mr. Jackson's book *An economist's confession of faith* (1935). Letters to the editor can also be found within the press clippings regarding similar themes. Arranged chronologically within their individual files, the press clippings, which are from newspapers across Canada and England, were possibly collected by Mr. Jackson.

Series 2 Teaching activities

[1921?]-1958, predominantly 1957-1958 0.19 m textual

The series consists mainly of course outlines and lectures written and delivered by Mr. Jackson while teaching an evening tutorial class in Economics in the Department of University Extension at the University of Toronto during the fall and winter of 1957-1958 . Mr. Jackson had been hired by the department to replace Prof. Helleiner who was on sick leave.² The series also contains incoming and outgoing correspondence between Mr. Jackson, assistants, acting directors and students regarding his teaching activities at the University of Toronto, as well as McGill University (1940) and McMaster University (1949). No records relating to his teaching at the University of Toronto prior to World War II are included in this series. The correspondence is predominantly between Mr. Jackson and Myron Kuzyck, a former student, on the subject of Kuzyck's legal case, education, lectures delivered, employment and other personal matters (1952-1953).

Arrangement of the files is predominantly chronological within each accession and box listed below.

Series 3 Manuscripts and off-prints

This series consists of articles, memoranda, reports, speeches, lectures, pamphlets, off-prints and books written by Mr. Jackson over a forty year span. Within the series, a “wordage of memoranda” written by Mr. Jackson illustrating the numbers of terms utilized within articles written from 1940 to 1946 is also provided.

Documenting Mr. Jackson's career, thought, views and influences in Canadian economics, the manuscripts document his work in: international exchange; Canada's economic prospect and stance on trade; the economic conditions of countries such as the United States and the United Kingdom; the effects of the war(s) on Canada's financial situation; the population and employment opportunities; unemployment; textiles and other merchandise; capitalism; conditions affecting interest rates; inflation; and the great depression.

The manuscripts within the series are arranged chronologically. All off-prints and books have been separated from the rest of the manuscripts and placed at the end of the series, in chronological order. A sound disk of Mr. Jackson's address to the Joint Brandon Canadian Club ([194-?]) was also removed from the other files within the series and placed with the special media collection.

Series 4 Canadian Tariff Board

1927-1958 0.26 m textual

The series consists of memorandums, research and reports completed by Mr. Jackson for himself as a consultant and counsel for firms appearing before the Canadian Tariff Board, a government body responsible for the tax levied upon goods imported into Canada. One of the first non-lawyers ever to appear before the Canadian Tariff Board with Mort Mendels, later secretary of the World Bank³, Mr. Jackson did research and produced reports on numerous Canadian goods and services, which are documented in Series 4. Arranged chronologically, the files within the series record the production, importing, exporting and trade of: coal and coke; cotton and woollen; hogs and wheat; copper, lead and zinc; fine paper; and well as Canada's railway mileage from the late 1920s to early 1930s. Mixed into the files on cotton and woollen is George H. Wood's article "An examination of some statistics relating to the wool textile industry" (1927).

The series also consists of reports or articles written about cotton manufacturing companies, the fine paper industry, approaches to post-war planning for York Knitting Mills Limited, Canadian Breweries, railway development and memorandum presented to the Tariff Advisory Board. A letter can also be found within the files on Canada's breweries regarding a public relations policy for brewers.

Series 5 National War Labour Board

[ca. 1927]-1943

0.19 m

The series consists of Mr. Jackson's involvement with the National War Labour Board, a federal government body that conducted investigations and dealt with issues pertaining to industrial disputes, fair wages, unemployment, distress caused by work, youth training and war measures. A member of the National War Labour Board between 1941 and 1943, Mr. Jackson was appointed by the Federal Minister of Labour to serve on the Industrial Disputes Inquiry Commission, handling various problems or queries that arose in a business or organization.

Arranged chronologically, the files within the series include: the nine Acts of Parliament utilized by Mr. Jackson when serving on the Industrial Disputes Inquiry Commission; correspondence, notes, case reports, agreements and articles from the Industrial Disputes Inquiry Commission; orders-in-council and interpretive rulings of the disputes Mr. Jackson dealt with from 1941-1942; the minutes of the National War Labour Board (1941-1943); a report of Royal Commission written to the Honourable Mr. Justice Barlow and James T. Stewart, Esquire regarding wage rates of employees in Algoma Steel Corporation Limited and Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation as well as correspondence regarding the case (1941-1943); reports on Sir Robert Borden and Canada's Naval Defence; reports of the Executive Committee to members of the National War Labour Board (1941-1943); instructions to the Regional War Labour Board's procedures and decision bulletins (1942); wartime wage control orders, which are order forms placed by companies and industries making requests on issues concerning wage rates, bonuses and changes in the number of days worked per week (1942); committee notes, reports, memoranda and observations made by members of the National War Labour Board (1942-1943); Little Steel Formula cases (1943); and J. L. Cohen's report to the Honourable Minister of Labour for Canada regarding the Board's public enquiry recommendations on creating better labour relations (17 Aug. 1943).

Acts that were consulted when resolving disputes and off-prints can be found mixed into the orders in council and interpretive ruling, and Industrial Disputes Inquiry Commission files. They include: *Information for employers regarding the Unemployment Insurance Act including summary of regulations* (Ottawa: Unemployment Insurance Commission, 1941); *Wartime orders in council affecting labour* (Ottawa: Department of Labour, 1942); *Suggested procedure for the enforcement of wartime wages control order* (Ottawa: Department of Labour); Chapter 3 of *Acts of 1936* (1939); *The Rights and privileges of Canada Packers Toronto employees* (Toronto: Toronto Plant Relations Committee, 31 Jul. 1941).

Series 6 National Selective Service Advisory Board

The series consists of the records related to Gilbert Jackson's involvement in the National Selective Service Advisory Board from the 1942-1945. A commission that was empowered in 1942, the National Selective Service Advisory Board oversaw the mobilization of civilian human resources and military during the Second World War⁴. Ruled under the direction of Deputy Minister of Labour Arthur MacNamara, the commission's mobilization efforts emphasized conciliation, compromise and de-centralization as they focused on issues regarding the recruitment of Native Canadians for home defence, the essential control of the coal labour force in Nova Scotia, the deferment policies affecting university students and the control of women within the primary textile industry. A government body that had weak administrative control and strong social opposition to required mobilization measures, the National Selective Service Advisory Board was short lived.

The files have been separated into two distinct functions: the minutes belonging to the National Selective Service Advisory Board Subcommittee on Industrial Relations (29 Jul. 1942-31 Aug. 1942) and National Selective Service Advisory Board (6 May 1942-21 Nov. 1945); and subject files, which include the orders-in-council (1942-1945), the Subcommittee on Industrial Relations' general memoranda on industrial relations and draft resolutions (1942), the National Selective Service Advisory Board's memoranda on general information (1942-1943) and a submission to the Royal Commission on Coal on a survey that was completed on data workers in the coal mines of Nova Scotia (17 Mar. 1945).

Series 7 Other Federal Government research and reports

1938-1952 0.07 m textual

The series consists of notes, research and reports written by Gilbert Jackson and other unofficial committee members for various Royal Commissions and Special Committees from the late 1930s to early 1950s. Arranged alphabetically under the name of the company the report was written for, the commission or special committee, the files within the series include reports to: the Great-Lakes Newfoundland Atlantic Company Limited (1938); Royal Commission on Banking and Currency (1933); Royal Commission on Canada's Economic Prospects (1956); Special Committee on Economic Re-establishment and Social Security of the Senate and the Special Committee on Reconstruction and Re-establishment of the House of Commons of Canada (1958); Special Committee on Price Spreads and Mass Buying (1934); and Standing Committee on Finance (1951-1952). Documenting Canada's economic investments, prospects and problems with regards to the war, social welfare plans and tariffs, as well as Canadian Chartered banks and returns, the series also consists of a file on taxation and income charts for Canada, Britain and the United States ([194-?]).

Series 8 Bank of England

1935-1939 0.56 m textual

The series consists of a book with typed notes of conversations, and both personal and business related incoming and outgoing correspondence written between 1935 and 1939, when Mr. Jackson was advisor to the Governors of the Bank of England. The series mainly consists of outgoing correspondence written by Mr. Jackson to family, friends, acquaintances, students, colleagues and committee members living within the United Kingdom, Canada, the United States, Jerusalem and Italy. Arranged chronologically, the correspondence deals with: the termination of Mr. Jackson's teaching position at the University of Toronto; his position at the Bank of England; the activities, events and accomplishments of his family; his book *An Economist's confession of faith* (1935); Mr. Jackson's opinions and views of England at the time; the economic condition of Canada and England during the late 1930s; reflections on his work at the University of Toronto; the employment situation of his students, friends and acquaintances; and the development of the Economics department at the University of Toronto.

Accompanying the correspondence are two indexes (1937 and 1938), possibly created by Mr. Jackson's secretary at the Bank of England. The indexes list the name of the person who sent the letter (in alphabetical order) with a number that was placed on the letter at the time it was received.

Mixed into the correspondence are articles, newspaper clippings, off-prints and speeches written by academics and consultants on various economic and financial issues within Canada and England. Sent to Mr. Jackson from family, friends, acquaintances, students and colleagues, the articles, newspaper clippings, off-prints and speeches are also arranged chronologically.

Series 9 **Gilbert Jackson & Associates**

1933, 1945-1958 **0.53 m** **textual**

The series consists of files related to Mr. Jackson's consulting firm, Gilbert Jackson & Associates, which was established in three parts during the early 1930s. The first part of the business began when Mr. Jackson was a consulting economist who was assigned to complete special assignments for corporations such as Canadian General Electric in negotiations with United Electrical Workers, and General Motors Canada. During this period, Mr. Jackson also wrote briefs to the Spence Royal Commission of Coasting Trade for Canadian Ship Building and Repair Association and the Borden Royal Commission on Energy for Imperial Oil.

Achieving great success, the second part of the business developed around the mid 1940s. Known as Sentinel Associates Limited, the investment counselling company's clients included Lever Brothers of Canada Ltd. and a private company named Sentinel Securities of Canada Ltd.

The third part of the office was the Canadian Council for Economic Studies, with Wallace Goforth as Executive Director. A retired colonel in the Canadian Army who had served as Deputy Director General of Defense Research during the 2nd World War, W.W. Goforth was the son of Reverend Jonathan Goforth (1859-1926), the well-known Presbyterian minister in China where W.W. Goforth was born in North Honan on November 25, 1899. After attending the University of Toronto, he studied at McGill University where he received his Masters degree. Before World War II he was professor of economics at McGill (1924-1929) and a consulting economist. Mr. Jackson firm known as the Canadian Council for Economic Studies⁵. He ran Mr. Jackson's company until his death in [1956?] A Council that met quarterly, many studies were commissioned from academics and other able economists who published under their own names but under the label Gilbert Jackson & Associates.

Arranged alphabetically by function, the files within the series include: company records from the Canadian General Electric Company Ltd (1953), Dominion Textile Co. Limited (1952), General Motors (1954), Hamilton Porcelains, Ltd (1956), Huron & Erie Mortgage Corporation (1952), John Inglis Co. (1952), Ogilvie Flour Mills Company Limited (1944), Rolland Paper Company (1955), St. Lawrence Seaway Authority (1955-1958), Steel Company of Canada Limited (1954) and Vick Chemical Company (1958); typed outgoing correspondence regarding retail coal prices, the consumer price index, the wholesale coal index (1954) and the Mutual Security Programme (1957); manuscripts written by academics and other able economists; the House of Commons Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce minutes of proceedings and evidence (1944, no. 1-no. 53 and 1947, no. 9), the first reading of Bill 7 (1944), and the House of Commons debates (Aug. 1944); biographies, incoming and outgoing correspondence, speeches, articles, off-prints and newspaper clipping written by and about the late Philip Christian Armstrong, an employee of the Canadian Pacific, economist and friend of Gilbert Jackson & Associates (1942-1952); research

memorandums by Gilbert Jackson & Associates (1949-1950); reports, correspondence, cases and memorandum to the Royal Commission on the Canadian Coasting Trade (1955); charts on the United States College Endowment Funds (1956?); and copies of minutes of meetings on "The International Functions of Gold", a London, England discussion group chaired by Sir Charles Addis, that met monthly to discuss "the International uses of Gold" (1929-1931). Mixed into the manuscripts are typed incoming and outgoing correspondences regarding the articles or speeches written by members of Gilbert Jackson & Associates.

The series also contains files containing correspondence, reports and papers produced by: W. W. Goforth (1953-1956); H. G. Littler (1942-1947); and John L. (Lorne) McDougall, a University of Toronto graduate (BA 1921, MA 1923) and professor in the Department of Economics at Queen's University. His reports on the Combines Act will also be found among these records (1954-1955).⁶

All books and proceedings have been separated from the rest of the manuscripts and placed at the end of the series, in chronological order. These include the House of Commons Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce minutes of proceedings and evidence (1944, no. 1-no. 53 and 1947, no. 9), the first reading of Bill 7 (1944), and the House of Commons debates (Aug. 1944).

Finally, records related to the Canadian Council for Economic Studies can be found within the series. Arranged chronologically, the files within the series include: passed and cancelled council bulletins (1944-1950); an article by E. Harrison Clark "Analysis of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1948" (12 Apr. 1948); summaries of views expressed at private dinner meetings (1950-1951); and the Washington Papers (1950-1951).
