A sister, Martha (Mattie) and two brothers, Ritchie and David, also graduated from the University. Always interested in writing, she was a member of the Varsity news staff in her second and third years. In 1932 she joined the Women's Press Club, becoming its secretary the following year. Her articles and poems were published under the name "Hal Clark". She was also, during her second year, a member of the League of Nations Club.
