#### BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

James L. Baillie was born in Toronto, July 4, 1904, and educated at King Edward School and Harbord Collegiate which he attended at night. He joined the staff of the Royal Ontario Museum in 1922 and served in the Department of Ornithology as Technical Assistant, Research Assistant and Assistant Curator successively, until his death.

Beginning in 1955 he conducted a series of lectures for the University of Toronto Extension entitled <u>An introduction to the Study of birds</u>.

His long association with <u>The Toronto Evening Telegram</u> began in 1931 when he started his weekly column on birds. This column ran for **3**9 years. He undertook many special assignments for <u>The Telegram</u>, writing many feature articles and guiding nature tours for them.

His writing output over the years was phenomenal. Besides writing two chapters of a book on the Saunders family, he was the author of over 300 articles, almost all on birds, but some on the broader concerns of conservation. He wrote scripts for radio and assisted with the preparation of educational films.

Much in demand as a speaker, he lectured all over Ontario. However, his P.R. work for the Museum is what his true disciples remember best. No budding naturalist was ever turned away from the ornithology department, and many of the best known names in natural history to-day are "graduates" of his patient explanations in the bird room & in the field.

He belonged to many organizations. Among them were: The American Ornithologists' Union, the Toronto Field Naturalists, The Federation of Ontario Naturalists, The Canadian Audubon Society, the Toronto Ornithological Club, the Toronto Field Biologists' Club, and the Brodie Club. Of the latter three groups he was a founding member. He held offices in all the Canadian organizations on the list. He corresponded with naturalists all over the world and collected books avidly.

He died on May 24, 1970, one month before what would have been the date of his official retirement from the R.O.M. In the last years of his

life he had received some official recognition for his great work, and his name is commemorated in the Jim Baillie Nature Reserve near Uxbridge and in the yearly Baillie Birdathon at Long Point, the proceeds of which go to the Long Point Bird Observatory.
