Dats'ko, Kyrylo, polk. (1905-1963), professor of physics, political activist, publicist; in Germany from 1943, where, in 1945, he helped from the Ukrainian Revolutionary Democratic Party and the publishing house Ukrainski visiti. (2 illustrations)

Hlian'ko, Fedir (1879-1955), active in the workers' movement, co-founder of the Ukrainian Workers' Theater in Kharkiv, member of the Central Rada, delegate of the Labour Congress in 1919; in emigration from 1944 (immigrated to the United States in 1950).

Slyn'ko, [I.] (unidentified)

Vryniak, P[avlo] (unidentified)

Rud', Iurii "The Fox", engineer (unidentified)

Sushko, Mykola (1909-), lawyer, political activist; headed the Sich student society in Vienna (1931-1932) and the Ukrainian Institute of Trust in Berlin (1938-1945); after the war worked as a publisher in Salzburg.

Sadlych, Stefa, secretary of the? Executive in Canada.

Lysak, Borys, engineer, head of TUPV branch in Mannheim (Society of Ukrainian Political Prisoners)

Skybits'kyi, Vasyl' or Volodymyr, DP camp office manager (unidentified)

Kop'iak, Petro [Canada] (unidentified)

Nazarenko, Mykola.

Lysak, Raisa, gymnasium student, emigrated to the U.S.

Lytvyn, Oleksander, agronomist.

Diiamand, officer in charge of food distribution.

Fedchuk, [Bohdan] (1907-), teacher and writer, in Germany taught at a DP camp gymnasium (1944-1948); emigrated to Canada in 1948.

Hrohul', Makar, shopkeeper.

Pavlyshyn, O., head of the DP camp office in Mannheim.

Baran, Stepan, dr. (1879-1953), politician, lawyer, journalist, and community leader; member of the Ukrainian National Rada of the Western Ukrainian National Republic (1918-1919) and of the Polish Sejm (1928-1939); emigrated to Germany in 1944, where, from 1951 to 1953, he headed the executive of the Ukrainian National Council in exile. (2 illustrations)

Pavlovskyi, [Vadym] prof. (1907-1986), chemist, historian and scholar, taught in Heidelberg (1944-1946); emigrated to the U.S.

Zavadovych, [Roman] prof. (1903-1985), writer and teacher; in Germany taught at the DP camp gymnasium in Bad Worishofen (1945-1948); emigrated to the U.S. in 1949.

Baranyk, director of the gymnasium.

Mrkvitsa (Mrkwica?), captain

Podubyns'ka, (Olimpia / Olimpiada?) prof., Ukrainian language professor at Kyiv University, a member of OUN.

Smen'ko, R. (female)

Zavidnevich, Mrs.

Pavlyshyn, M., nurse (could be Maria Pasichnyk-Pavlyshyn, a nurse (1911-), immigrated to Canada in 1948)

Lytvyn (older female)

Pavlyshyn, Iulian (1908-2008), head of "Plast" in Mannheim, a physician and community activist; earned his doctorate in medicine from the University of Heidelberg; emigrated to the U.S. in 1950.

Min'kovs'kyi, Myron, geologist, captain of the DP camp in Mannheim; emigrated to the U.S.

Hladkyi, Orest, engineer, "'Moskal' who hid himself among the Ukrainians, a coward and an informer."

Revai, Iuliian, Minister (1899-1979), teacher, editor, publisher and political-leader in Transcarpathia, served as minister and prime minister of Carpatho-Ukraine (1938-1939); escaped to the American zone of Germany in 1945, where he served on the executive of the Central Representation of the Ukrainian Emigration; immigrated to the U.S. in 1948. (2 illustrations)

Kurdydyk, Anatol (1905-2001), writer, journalist, and community activist; edited *Krakivski visti* during the war; in Germany from 1945 to 1951; emigrated to Canada in 1951.

Zubrytskyi, Vasyl (1892-1971), emigrated to the U.S.

Tyshchenko, Iurii (1880-1953), carpenter, choir master, "one of the most honest citizens of Mannheim"; a teacher, publisher, writer, translator, and community activist.

Fedchuk, [Bohdan] (1907-), teacher and writer, in Germany taught at a DP camp gymnasium (1944-1948); emigrated to Canada in 1948. (another illustration, different from above)

Drozdovskyi, Volodymyr, associated with Ettlingen, coworker of [Supliak?]

Pavlenko, Olia, copyeditor of DP camp newspaper, worked in the UNRRA; emigrated to Canada.

Nasenko (female), studied in Heidelberg, worked in the UNRRA.

Prots, Olia, worked in the UNRRA, "an outstanding chorister."

Molden, Capt., a UNRRA administrator in Mannheim.

Manovych, Mykh. (female)

Holovatyi, M., director, from Heidelberg (probably Mykhailo Holovatyi (1908-1988), a chemist)

Bondar, Tymofei, engineer, worked in the DP camp's household and food department; "another of the most honest citizens of Mannheim."

Savchyn, Mykhailo (1895-1964), shopkeeper in Mannheim, former Ukrainian Sich Rifleman and member of the Ukrainian Galician Army; emigrated to the U.S.

Tomaschek (Tomasek), Alois (1917-1992), director of the UNRRA in Mannheim; later an East German spy captured by the West in 1976.

Holovatyi, M., dr. (2<sup>nd</sup> illustration, different from above)

Chushak, Hryhroii, dr. (?-1963), "intriguer and breaker of unity in the Mannheim DP camp," a veterinarian by profession; emigrated to the U.S.

Harashchuk, Ivan, "one of the worst people in Mannheim."

Kramar, Zina (or Kateryna Ka?), teacher and salesclerk for TUPV (Society of Ukrainian Political Prisoners)

Kulchytskyi, Fylymon o., (1891-1972) Ukrainian Greek Orthodox priest in Mannheim; lived in Germany from 1944 to 1948; emigrated to Canada.

Rushkevych / Rutkevych, M., "an intriguer and one of the worst people in Mannheim."

Sobolevskyi, "one of the warmest personalities in Mannheim."
