### Biographical sketch

Dr. Charles Edward Stanbury, raised and educated in Toronto, was a practicing physician in Chicago, Illinois during the later part of his life. He was born in 1863 in Cornwall, England, son of Henry Stanbury and Susanne Free, who settled in the town of Yorkville. In 1881 Stanbury was living in the St. James Ward area of Toronto and in 1891 was employed as a stenographer. He graduated from Trinity College Medical School in 1897, at the age of 34. About 1904 Charles left Toronto. According to Ellis Island Passenger arrival lists, Dr. Stanbury arrived in the United States from Vera Cruz, Mexico in 1904. He subsequently settled and practiced in Chicago.

Stanbury was married to Amanda Nourse and had four children in Toronto: Charles H., Amanda Joy, Ewart D., and Bessie Bernice. Dr. Stanbury returned to the United States from Mexico accompanied by a second wife, Olive (nee Peterson). Amanda Nourse Stanbury remained in Toronto with their children and died in Toronto at age 73. Charles Stanbury died in Chicago on July 12, 1938 and is buried in the Rosehill Cemetery.

### Scope and content

The fonds consists of documents and photographs related to Dr. Stanbury's education at the Trinity Medical College, and his later life in Chicago.

**1. Trinity Medical College Admission card** [1891] Printed card allowing the identified student (Chas E. Stanbury) to be admitted to the 'Anatomy—General Descriptive, and Surgical' class taught by Hugh Robertson in the 1891/92 session; Trinity Medical College seal printed on the front of the card; on the reverse is handwritten statement "Attendance certified W.B. Geikie, Dean, March 1892"

**2. Toronto General Hospital Certificate** [1896] Printed certificate stating that Mr. C. Stanbury was present at requisite number of visits to autopsies conducted at the hospital under the direction of General Hospital pathologists, was deemed competent to write Post Mortem examination reports, reported a satisfactory number of cases of clinical medicine and surgery, and is proficient in vaccination. Signed March 1895 by medical superintendent

**3. University of Trinity College Certificate for passing Primary Examination for degree of M.D.** [1894] Signed April 4, 1894 by Registrar William Jones

**4. Calling card** [19--] Engraved name and partial address: Charles Edward Stanbury, Chicago, One North La Salle Street.

**5. Membership card for The British Empire Association of Illinois** [193-?] Printed card with handwritten member name "Dr. Charles E. Stanbury" and handwritten signature of the Association Secretary Cyril C Spong; reverse side ink stamped with name, address and telephone of Association

**6. Obituary of Mrs. Amanda Nourse Stanbury** [1936?] Clipping from an unidentified newspaper listing the names of surviving children Mrs. A.H. Gourlay (Toronto), Miss Bessie Stanbury (Toronto), Mr. C.H. Stanbury (Winnipeg) and Mr. E.D. Stanbury (Toronto)

**7. Photograph of unidentified man and woman, possible a wedding photograph** [19--?] : negative; b&w; 12.5 x 10.0 cm
