"Then comes my grand pleasure sensual greedy-gut daily delight & joy -- my supreme pleasure & satisfaction of the day ... i.e. 2 teaspoonfuls of tea in A smallish tea-pot a black kettle boiling on the fire close at hand if possible in the kitchen where I always have my happiest meal i.e breakfast -- as much sugar as I can get--..."

Powys, John Cowper, Corwen, North Wales, to Max Schuster. June 28, 1942. T.L. carbon copy of A.L.S. 3 leaves.

Has received his letters of May 25 and June 4, but has not yet received the new Inner Sanctum edition of War and Peace. Is now having his book on Old Age typed for which he needs a "good challenging and provocative title". He needs to write another book quickly to earn his living and lists four

possibilities on which he asks Schuster's advice.

Powys, John Cowper, Blenau-Ffestiniog, North Wales to [Hal Trovillion] August 31, 1958. A.L.S. Folder. With xerox copy, 4 leaves.

Notes the date of his letter, August 18th, as being the 50th birthday of his private press at the Sign of the Silver Horse. Replies to questions in his August letter; Phyllis wishes that she could give him a decent breakfast and thanks him for asking about her. His American sister Marian Powys Grey has returned to her home after visiting them. She had to resign the job as head of the Lace Department of the Metropolitan Museum because of her arthritis. He recently received a bronze plaque from the Academy of Fine Arts in Hamburg where he had gone to lecture on Shakespeare.

Powys, John Cowper, Blenau-Ffestiniog, North Wales, to Constance Vulliany, Parkville, Missouri. April 16, 1959. A.L.S. Folder. With envelope.

Thanks her for writing him about Mary Rebecca Harrison to whom he is sending a reprint of his Art of Happiness. He reminisces about the only other Constance whom he knew, about his childhood and about his brothers and sisters.

Referring to his letter in the Western Gazette, he explains why he wrote those statements in his review of Mr. Ward's book, and apologizes for not having shown him that chapter.
